This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

At Houghton on the Hill Primary School we aim to develop the children's skills in solo and group performance so they build a sense of community whilst performing. We will help them to develop skills in singing, playing, listening, composing and performing, using a range of stimuli and instruments. We will give them the opportunity to see and hear performance from around the world and encourage them to foster an emotional and spiritual response to the music they hear. We aim to help the children develop an understanding of the breadth of music from around the world and how it links to our cultural heritage. We want children to understand how music can be a response to historical, geographical or religious contexts and be used to promote growth mindset and wellbeing through opportunities to experiment, make choices, practice mindfulness and express difference and opinions. We hope by doing this we will help children at Houghton develop a deep love of listening to, composing and performing music as a way of expressing who they are.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

We have recently set up a new Primary Scheme for Music called: the Leicestershire Primary Music Scheme. This scheme comes from the Leicestershire Music Hub.

The new scheme covers 6 areas of music:

- Unit 1: Pulse
- Unit 2: Voice
- Unit 3: Rhythm
- Unit 4: Pitch
- Unit 5: Music tech
- Unit 6: 20th Century.

Each half term in curriculum music, we cover a different unit of work. We group units on pulse and rhythm together across the Autumn term to really help consolidate the difference between pulse and rhythm and also how they are linked together. We spend the first half of the Spring term exploring pulse and the Summer term is spent investigating music technology. Unit 6 is covered across the whole year as a way to introduce the children to a ranges of genres gradually and so they have the opportunity to listen to lots of music within the genres they are investigating. Unit 2 is covered through our weekly singing assemblies as well as warm-ups to lessons in the other units taught across the year.

Each year group, from EYFS to Year 6, have a set of 6 lessons to follow within each unit which build on skills learnt in the previous year group. This allows us to see progression clearly across the school because every year group is learning each unit during the same half term.

Each year group from year 2 to year 5 will also be having 6 weeks of instrumental lessons in the Spring or summer terms to give them the opportunity to experience different types of tuned and rhythmic instruments as well as the chance to experience ensemble performance.

Currently we are offering the following instruments:

Year 2: Glockenspiel

Year 3: Boomwackers

Year 4: Ukelele

Year 5: Djembe

Music lessons can last between 30 to 45 minutes. In most classes Music is taught weekly although on some occasions it will be switched to fortnightly so that the children can have a longer lesson on composition and performance. The Leicestershire Primary Music scheme is informed by the model music curriculum, which although is non-

statutory, allows us to break down further and expand upon the minimal information given in the National Curriculum. We have access to the Leicestershire Music Hub for support in our music lesson provision and the delivering of the music scheme.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

We offer 1:1 piano tuition from year 1 up to year 6. These are currently taught during one and a half days in the week and are provided by local piano teacher Josephine Markham. These lessons are now in their 5th year, but newcomers are always welcome. They are normally involved in a performance in the Summer term to parents/carers and a different performance to the whole school as a way to encourage more children to take up lessons. There is a cost to these piano lessons and these are paid through Mrs Markham and they will communicate with parents directly.

This year we will be re-starting a choir at school, which meets during lunchtimes on Thursdays. It's a chance to sing different songs and learn particular singing skills, including ensemble performance. We are looking into providing opportunities for the choir to perform to parents and the other children in the school as part of our church services and festive celebrations.

We currently do not have any instrumental ensembles at school due to only have pianists having instrumental lessons. Hopefully once class instrumental lessons start, we may have the opportunity to provide Ukulele and Djembe drumming ensembles.

We're hoping, within LearnAt, to have a mass ensemble of choirs come together and sing and perform at some point this academic year. The music leads across the academy trust are keen to try and facilitate a massed choir singing event but careful thought needs to go into how this can be achieved due to the distances between our schools.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

In addition to the above musical opportunities, we have collective worship everyday. At some point in the Collective Worship assembly, we have a worship song that children and staff join in with. At the start of Collective worship, children have the opportunity to

listen to and watch musical performances from different genres so they can see what the ensemble they are listening to looks like and what different instruments are being used.

On Wednesdays, our Collective worship is a singing assembly. This is when the whole school comes together to practice worship songs, looking at developing musical elements such as singing at pitch, following a conductor, ensemble performance and singing in different parts through these songs, as well as worshipping. These practice sessions, allow us to then perform worship songs at festivals or celebrations, such as Christmas, Harvest or Easter.

Our year 6 children have the opportunity to rehearse and perform a production every year which involves singing and acting. This is performed over several performances to their parents and to the whole school.

Our Foundation stage children take part in a nativity performance at Christmas which they perform to the whole school and their parents.

The KS1 classes also perform, a nativity at Christmas which they perform in the local church to the whole school and their parents. They also perform this nativity to a primary school from the city who come to visit us at Christmas. We visit them during Diwali and at our visit we have the opportunity to take part in their Diwali assembly which involves singing and dancing.

As mentioned above, we have a yearly piano concert where the children get to perform to the rest of the school. This concert also involves audience participation with the children clapping rhythms for the children to perform to.

We also work with the local village hall to provide entertainment for their monthly soup lunch. We try to attend at least two of these a year where the instrumentalists have the opportunity to perform to an audience.

In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

We are in our 6th year of using the Leicestershire music scheme. We have restructured how music is being taught using this scheme for this academic year to cater for the fact we are no longer having whole class instrumental lesson in year 4 for the whole year. Hopefully this restructure will help provide more consistency across KS2 music which will help promote better progress in music across the school starting with a strong grounding in foundation stage and KS1.

We hope that re starting a choir will help build a group of singers who can perhaps help lead our singing assemblies and begin to offer other opportunities to this group, including carol singing at the Christmas Tree festival and other musical performances

outside of school such as taking part in Young Voices 2027 and maybe creating links with other schools in our Academy Trust.

We're are introducing a whole class musical instrument teaching block for all children in years 2-6 to replace the whole year brass lessons that were happening in Year 4 up to last academic year. I be monitoring closely and evaluate the effectiveness of this these lessons to consider whether 6 hour long sessions is a long enough time frame for this to be sucesssful.

As music lead, I will continue to make as inventory of all the musical instruments we currently have in school and make sure we have a good range of tuned and untuned instruments for children to use in composition activities whilst considering which instruments will ensure the best musical instrument teaching and learning is available. We will continue to build our musical instrument resource bank for whole class lessons on glockenspiel, boomwacker, ukelele and djembe and look into how these can be used to create school ensembles in the future.

As music lead, I will continue to support teachers in the delivery of the Leicestershire Primary Music scheme, and provide help, support and training available whenever possible if they are unconfident with the subject knowledge or musical skills needed to teach their relevant units of work.
